<p>The individuals involved in the strategic planning process reflect the diverse ethnic, socio-economic groups that are present in the community and among families served.</p> <p>Strategies used to engage diverse groups are culturally and linguistically appropriate and minimize the barriers facing low-income and working parents.</p>	<p align="center"><b>Strategic Planning Process</b></p>	<p>The results of the community assessment have been shared with the members of the broader community.</p> <p>The information collected is analyzed to reveal differences as well as similarities between conditions facing different socio-economic and ethnic groups and their families.</p>
<p>Priorities are not imposed by a single group but are agreed-upon by all the different groups that make up a community.</p> <p>Priorities also allow specific attention to a particular group.</p> <p>Ideal plan allows for both common priorities and for special approaches.</p>	<p align="center"><b>Prop 10 Strategic Plan</b></p>	<p>The plan has a clear linkage/relationship between desired results, needs, indicators, strategies, allocations and performance measures.</p> <p>The plan is driven by the results of the community assessment and data on progress toward desired results.</p> <p>Planning tools must be useful, clear and easily understood.</p>

<p>The Commission’s infrastructure, organizational capacity and tools can support and sustain a user-friendly inclusion process.</p> <p>Representative of the Leadership Team and the community participate fully in the allocation process at all stages.</p> <p>The Leadership Team helps develop the allocation criteria and assures that the process is inclusive.</p>	<p><b>Resource Allocation Process</b></p>	<p>The application process must be simple.</p> <p>Community Assessment results and data on how groups are achieving the desired outcomes guide decision-making.</p> <p>All grantees agree to track and report negotiated set of data including outcomes, demographics.</p>
<p>Local governance and involvement of community members is high.</p> <p>The process is linguistically accessible and culturally competent.</p>	<p><b>Services/Activities Being Implemented</b></p>	<p>The systems are in place to monitor and to track overall outcomes as well as results for different types of families and ethnic groups.</p> <p>The Grantees receive training and support for data tracking.</p>
<p>Information is shared and decision-making reflects broad input.</p> <p>The group, including staff and participants, regularly reviews the process and outcomes and makes adjustments as necessary.</p>	<p><b>Program Management and Technical Assistance</b></p>	<p>Reported information is shared for core improvements.</p> <p>All program staff, volunteers and participants are aware of desired outcomes and the tracking system. Time is allocated to select and review outcomes and consider what to do even better.</p>
<p>The evaluator and the community together develop a logic model and define what’s important to measure.</p> <p>Community groups have understanding of evaluation processes and participate fully on the evaluation team.</p>	<p><b>Evaluation/ Measuring Impact</b></p>	<p>Engage community in deciding what’s going to be evaluated. Clarity is critical.</p> <p>Provide resources for technical assistance and for building community capacity for understanding the importance of “valuation”.</p> <p>The evaluation provides information about the effectiveness of Prop 10 funded programs for different ethnic groups.</p>
<p>Programs are held accountable for producing equitable outcomes.</p> <p>Involve community in continuous improvement.</p> <p>Provide continuing education for evaluators so that mutual learning occurs between evaluation experts and community groups.</p> <p>Celebrate successes and share progress with each other and the broader community.</p>	<p><b>Reporting And Communication</b></p>	<p>Providers are trained to use outcomes for staff and volunteer reflection.</p> <p>Create tools to support administrative systems enhancements.</p> <p>Regularly disseminate progress information about the process and outcomes.</p>
<p>Budget funds and provide resources so that community members can make adjustments and be involved throughout the process (i.e., childcare, travel allowance, stipends, translation (language &amp; concepts) and other necessities).</p>	<p><b>Course Alignment</b></p>	<p>Assure clear logical relationships between the desired results, needs, indicators and strategies.</p> <p>Process to focus on program impacts at least quarterly.</p> <p>Continually ask one another, “how can we do better?”</p>
